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Flying boat open sea rescue of USS Watchman sailor

At the Colorado reunion MMA member, Bob Noble related an open sea medical evacuation involving a YAGR ship off Seattle .He could not recall the ship or the crew members name. I asked and he volunteered to check his records and forward the details. Unfortunately he died (he was 96) before he could find the information. However his daughter, Carla Noble, going through his belongings came across my business card with a note on the back about the incident. She subsequently found the newspaper article about the operation and graciously forwarded it.

The crewman that was evacuated was Signalman Petty Officer 2 (SM2) R.L.Cypher from the USS watchman AGR-16 YAGRS Association has no record that Petty Officer Cypher was ever located or was member of the group.

VP-50 crew makes open sea evacuation

An emergency call was received by Navy Operations about 2 p.m. Wednesday from the USS Watchman, a Navy ship several hundred miles at sea.

Petty Officer 2nd class R. L. Cypher from Vallejo, California was stricken with what was believed to be appendicitis and it was considered advisable that he be transferred ashore to more adequate medical facilities.

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Within an hour a Navy P5M
Marlin from Patrol Squadron 50
based at Whidbey Island was
winging its way to the ship to
accomplish the transfer.

The pilot, LCDR R. E. Noble, reported the open sea landing uneventful despite heavy swells that were running in the area. Pilot Noble stated he was extremely proud of his Marlin and her crew.

Transfer of Cypher from ship to plane was completed in jig time and about 9 p.m. they were landing back at Whidbey Sea Drome.

Cypher was transferred to the Whidbey Island Naval Hospital where his condition was diagnosed as not critical. He will remain there for observation for a brief period before returning to duty aboard his ship.
