As you know by now, YAGRS will be holding its fourth reunion in Norfolk, VA on June 3,4,5 of 1999. Our host hotel will be the Hilton Norfolk Airport, 1500 North Military Highway, Norfolk, VA 23502. OnGoing Projects The Model Ship


The building of the model is moving right along. Bill Simcox (AGR-4 1960-61) says that he is on schedule for

Cold War Recognition

This may be of interest to some of you. It was passed on to me by Norman Atwater (AGR-5 1963-65)

In accordance with Section 1084 of the Fiscal Year 1998
National Defense Authorization Act, the Secretary of
Defense approved awarding Cold War Recognition
rtificates to all members of the armed forces and
alified federal government and civilian personnel who
faithfully served the United States during the Cold War era.
Requests will be accepted beginning April 5, 1999.

Who is eligible? All members of the armed forces and federal government and civilian personnel who faithfully served the United States during the Cold War era, Sept. 2, 1945, to Dec. 26, 1991.

Acceptable documents for proof of service for Military.

1. DD Form 214 (Certificate of Release/Discharge from Active Duty) 2. WD AGO (Form 53-55 War Department Separation Document) 3. Oath of Office - Military Personnel or Letter of Appointment.

Military Personnel may obtain a DD Form 214 by written application to:

National Personnel Records Center (Military Personnel Records) 9700 Page Avenue St. Louis, MO 63132-5100

send your request as a letter. Requests must contain enough information to identify the record among the more than 70 million on file at NPRC(MPR). Certain basic

information is needed to locate military service records. This information includes the veteran's complete name used while in service, service number or social security number, branch of service, and dates of service. Date and place of birth may also be helpful, especially if the service number is not known.

A request letter (SF 180)) for the Cold War Recognition will be available April 5, 1999 by the following means:

- Contact the National Archives and Records Administration's Fax-on-Demand System. The Fax on demand system makes brochures, informational sheets, and other documents available to Federal agencies and the members of the public who have access to fax machines. The SF 180 is available as document number 2259.
 NOTE: You must call the system from a fax machine (using the handset) in order to receive documents. Voice instructions will guide you. There is no charge for this service except for any long distance telephone charges you may incur. The phone number to access the fax-on-demand system is (301) 713-6905.
- 2. Call the NPRC(MPR) telephone information lines. Callers can leave the name and address to which they want the SF 180 sent. (314) 538-4141
- 3. Write to the National Personnel Records Center at the above address.

I will keep you up-dated on this as I get more information.

Sea Stories

Bad Weather "Now hear this! The weather deck is secured until further notice due to inclement weather." Inclement weather? THAT was an understatement. As Engineering log room yeoman, I had been watching the degree of rolling and pitching indicated by that "thing on the wall" in the Engineering office. (I know there's a proper name for that device but damned if I can think of it now!) Anyway, I haven't forgotten seeing the scale roll over to a point where the bubble indicated a roll to starboard of 42 degrees! Yikes, I thought. If this thing is going over, I think I'd rather be outside than in! And that was before I saw Titanic! The idea of a trip through shaft

Alley and up the ladder to after steering was born at lunch that day. Naturally, weather was the topic of discussion and Mac told us that he had the stern watch. I don't think he was looking forward to four hours alone at the stern and suggested that it should be a dynamite spot from which to view the high seas for anyone willing to keep him company. Of course, since the weather deck was secured, the shaft alley was the only legal access. Anyone who has climbed that ladder knows it's not an exercise you do for the fun of it; but after witnessing the 42 degree roll, I was inspired. Mac was right to suggest that the up-close-and-personal view of our picket station from the door at aft steering was quite spectacular.

I'm sure he can tell you it was even more spectacular from the fantail itself as he discovered shortly after my arrival. Mac got a call from the bridge instructing him to go out to the fantail and make sure the stern light was lit. I remember that he balked at the idea and was threatened with being placed on report if he refused further. So, out he went.

No sooner had he disappeared around the corner when I felt LOCATOR'S bow dive in to a deep trough. On the fantail, of course. We were high and dry (and I do mean high). You know what happens next: the bow goes up and the stern goes down (and I do mean DOWN). In fact in this case, it went UNDER. Now I know that many will think this impossible but you can bet that Ralph Mc Allister will bear me out. We dropped like a rock.

Fearing for his life, I stepped out of the door just in time to see him down on one knee at the aft rail. He was facing forward, left hand on the rail, right hand clutching his white hat. Water was pouring, I swear, a foot or more over his head. The fantail was UNDER WATER! At this, helmets were washed out of the racks in which they had been stored and were floating everywhere. Of course, we were on our way back "up" by the time he scrambled to the door and safety. Needless to say, old Mac was one scared deck-ape while I had only one wet foot for having stepped out the door.

Was the light on? I don't recall his report to the bridge but I will say this for the guy: he stayed on with Uncle Sam, to retire as a Chief Petty Officer in spite of the experience. I, on the other hand, got out and have been selling insurance ever since!

This story is passed on as best I remember it; but it goes back to 1960, so some of the details may have changed little over time. But this is how I remember it.

We were on the end of a run up on station 14 l believe. A message was received from an AGR north of us on station 12 that they had a crew member who had "lost it". Since we were going in in a few days, they ask if we would take him in with us. The ship agreed and also agreed to take in mail and swap movies. We rendezvoused half way between stations for a highline transfer. As seemed to be the policy at the time, the meeting took place around 0600 so we were all up at 0400 to get ready.

We "provided" so our crew was spread out down the port side "heaving around". Movies and mail were exchanged and then it was time for the personnel transfer. The weather was calm, just the usual ground swells, so there wasn't too much concern over the transfer. The ships were in constant communication via flashing light. The ship transferring to us said they had the man in a straight jacket and recommended to us we do the same. For safety purposes they would remove him from the straight jacket during the actual transfer in case he went in the water. The group on the receiving end was briefed and was prepared to put the guy in a straight jacket when he hit the deck. These guys made the Green Bay Packers starting line look small.

The chair came up and the man came across without a problem. When he landed on our deck, they pulled out the straight jacket and the fight was on. This guy was not going to put it on. Our guys won after a little wrestling match. As soon as he was subdued, the flashing light came on from the other ship. "Wrong nut. That one is just an officer going on leave." The officer was released and the second personnel transfer was on. This time the guy got out of the chair and held his arms out and put on the straight jacket.

We came home to Davisville a few days later with one calm patient to transfer to Quonset and one Ensign with a black eye to go on leave.
