The "Fabulous Fifties."







While the primary mission of the radar picket vessels was guarding the skies, they performed other tasks while on station, such as a floating weather station and when needed helped in search and rescue missions for ships and/or aircraft.

land Cote, John Hemminger and Harry Miller have spent some more time on the restoration of the duct work on turret #1. The work we have J date has been replacing the deteriorated sections of the duct. Now we had to correct the cause of the damage, water getting into the duct. While we knew where the water was coming in, we could not get to it from the outside because the turrets optical range finder was over the area in question. So, the only option we had was to cut out a section of the duct so that we could gain access to the area that was allowing the water to get in. Once we had done that and looked over the rusted out area, we found that we would have to replace a section 4' by 1' 2". After cutting out the rusted out section of plate and welding in a new piece of steel plate, we also decided to do a little preventive maintenance work by installing a drain line at the top of the duct and running it through the duct so it would drain out through the bottom of the duct. This should help to prevent water from being trapped at the point where the turret and duct work meet.

Work Weekend.

We had 6 former crewmen working on our exhibit the weekend of November 12, 13, 14, 2004. The 6 were: Roland Cote (AGR-10, 1961-63), Jack Floyd (AGR-11, 1962-64, YR-65, 1964-65), Henry "Harry" MacKay (AGR-12, 1962-64), Harry Miller (AGR-11, 1962-64, YR-65, 1964-65), Al Nannini (AGR-15, 1960-62) and Jim Spiegel (AGR-12, 1963-65).

We managed to get a long overdue project done. The forward bulkhead of our exhibit space was an area that needed some attention. With the bulkhead framing, cable runs, duct work and miscellaneous piping it would be almost impossible to mount anything on it. So we decided to open up this wasted space by installing plywood sheeting on the framework.

After cutting and bolting the plywood to the bulkhead frames, we now had 2 major obstacles in the way, large vents that ran across the overhead to the bulkhead and down it to just above the deck. The only thing we could do was to box them in. This involved forming around them and this proved to be a project in itself. We did not want to come off the sheeting square but at an angle, (this would give a better visual impact). We cut and installed the plywood around the vents (no square cuts, all ends cuts were mitered). Now we have another area where we can mount photo's, paintings and a few other displays that are in the works.

At this time we do not expect to be doing much on the ship due to the holidays, but one never knows. Roland, John and Harry have been known to make arrangements at the last minute to go onboard and work on a few odds and ends as the mood strikes them.
